MINUTES

1. CALL TO ORDER – Mayor Grove called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.
2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG
3. ROLL CALL of Town Council – Town Clerk Amy Moyer called the roll. Ms. Gill, Mr. Gritsko, Ms. Knotts, Mr. Nolt, and Mr. Smith were present. Ms. Kerlin was absent. Also in attendance was Town Administrator George Goodwin.
4. CONSENT CALENDAR
 - 4.1. Approval of Agenda
 - 4.2. Financial Report for April 2016
 - 4.3. Minutes – Regular Session of April 18, 2016
 - 4.4. Minutes – Working Session of May 9, 2016

Mayor Grove stated that there was one additional item for the agenda, which is the mowing contract, at the request of Mr. Smith. Mr. Smith moved to suspend the rules to adjust the agenda to add the mowing contract. Mr. Gritsko seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

Mayor Grove invited visitors to speak before proceeding with the agenda.

Scottsville District Supervisor Rick Randolph offered congratulations on the recent municipal election. Mr. Randolph reported on the broadband committee, proposals for expanded social services, and the All God's Children Child Development Center open house. He plans to arrange a meeting next month with the county executive, the new county attorney, the new mayor, and the town administrator to discuss the drafting of a new MOU between the county and the town, to include potential new topics such as public safety and parks and recreation. Mr. Randolph noted that the Scottsville levee went from provisionally accredited status to accredited by FEMA, necessitating amendments to the county flood ordinance reflecting the new effective map date. ADA improvements at the Scottsville Library will require the library to close for two weeks in August. The school board's bonding proposal includes funding for security improvements at Scottsville Elementary, but Mr. Randolph raised some questions regarding the strategic planning and empirical evidence for some of the proposed expenditures, given the tax burden for bonding schools this year and the court complex next year. Mr. Randolph reported that Thomas Jefferson Soil and

Water Conservation District will receive DEQ funding of \$143,900 to assist homeowners with repairs, replacement, pump-outs, and hookups to public sewer.

Ms. Knotts asked about alternate or supplemental homework assignments for students without Wi-Fi access at home. Mr. Randolph said the goal of the school division is to see every student have Wi-Fi access, but right now their only way to complete assignments is to go to outside facilities such as the parking lot of their school, which is inexcusable. Mr. Randolph commented that internet access is increasingly being viewed as a government responsibility, but before they get too far ahead, he and Liz Palmer would like to meet with the board of supervisors to talk about funding options.

Rita Krenz with the Scottsville Volunteer Squad spoke regarding staffing concerns. Mayor Grove offered his congratulations on the recent well-attended open house. Ms. Krenz said the event was put together by their vice president, and they got three volunteers interested in a driving class. She explained that that staffing shortages reached a critical level two weeks ago. Facing the potential of an unstaffed weekend, she notified Albemarle County, which is responsible for providing for ensuring that emergency medical services are provided. Ms. Krenz said this is not a new problem, as the squad has been significantly short-handed for the last 18 months. She has eight providers covering nine shifts. Recruiting has been successful, with several new EMTs in training and two new paramedics, so the immediate problem will be solved in the short term, and Albemarle County Fire and Rescue has been very supportive, but she is concerned about the long term, as volunteering at the rescue squad is a huge time commitment.

Mayor Grove expressed appreciation for the service the rescue squad provides to the community, and he encouraged people to consider volunteering. Ms. Krenz noted that the squad will provide all the training.

Mr. Nolt asked about response times. Ms. Krenz said that if they are in the station and the station is staffed, they typically get out the door in 90 seconds to two minutes, and then the time depends on how far you are from the station. Ms. Krenz stated that if it is a second-due call where folks are coming from home, then it is in the five-to-ten-minute range for somebody to get to the station. The next closest ambulance comes from Station 11 (Monticello), and that is a 20-minute trip down Route 20.

Ms. Knotts asked about the time commitment after certification. Ms. Krenz said that associate members do two shifts per month, and full members run one shift per week, with a rotating Saturday or Sunday. Most providers are doing two shifts per week to provide coverage.

In response to Ms. Gill, Ms. Krenz listed where and when classes are available during the year.

Ms. Gill moved to approve the consent calendar and amended agenda. Mr. Gritsko seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

5. PUBLIC FORUM – No one from the public rose to speak.
6. REMARKS FROM RITA KRENZ, SCOTTSVILLE VOLUNTEER RESCUE SQUAD – Ms. Krenz spoke previously.

7. MAYOR’S REPORT

Mayor Grove congratulated the newly-elected mayor and council members. He commented that he is confident that the new council is strong and the new mayor will be a good leader, and they will carry on the work of this council, which has been remarkable in the way that it has worked together and the amount of time and effort it has given town matters, and he is happy that he was able to work with them.

Mayor Grove reported that he has been working on economic development issues. He is advised that 330 Valley Street has been sold. He has seen preliminary conceptual plans for a housing development on the plant site. There are also plans for the plant building itself, but too early to say anything more. Mayor Grove noted the opening of James River Wine and Specialty. He has spent time working on the budget with the new mayor and staff.

Mayor Grove reported that he authorized a postponement of the trial of the case that the town brought against Albemarle Properties related to the deterioration of 135 Warren Street on the basis that substantial progress on rehabilitation has been accomplished. The trial is now set for July. Mayor Grove also authorized a judgment to be entered against a delinquent taxpayer and the issuance of attachments against the bank accounts of the taxpayer.

8. PUBLIC HEARING ON FY 2017 BUDGET

Mayor Grove opened the public hearing on the advertised Fiscal Year 2017 Budget. There being no one from the public who wished to speak, the public hearing was closed. The budget was placed on the June work session agenda for further consideration.

9. PUBLIC HEARING ON ORDINANCE ADDING A NEW SECTION 58-44.1 TO THE TOWN CODE RESTRICTING THE USE OF BOW AND ARROW, REQUIRING A PERMIT FOR AN ARCHERY RANGE, AND SETTING OUT THE REQUIREMENTS FOR URBAN ARCHERY HUNTING

Mayor Grove opened the public hearing. There being one from the public who wished to speak, the public hearing was closed.

Mr. Nolt explained that the ordinance is based on a proposal from the Public Safety Committee to allow hunting within the town limits with regulations to keep residents safe, such as the size of land, direction of shooting, and distance from homes, sidewalks, roads, etc. Discharge of firearms is illegal within the town limits, but there is no reference to archery in the current code. The proposal allows bow hunting on parcels of land of three or more acres.

Mr. Smith moved to amend the Town Code to add the section 58-44.1. Ms. Gill seconded the motion.

Mr. Smith commented that he instigated this after he had a bow hunter outside his sunroom window shooting upwards. He thinks the committee and the chief of police have done an excellent job drafting this ordinance.

A roll call vote was conducted.

By a vote of 5-0, the following ordinance was adopted:

AN ORDINANCE ADDING A NEW SECTION 58-44.1 TO THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF SCOTTSVILLE
 RESTRICTING THE USE OF BOW AND ARROW, REQUIRING A PERMIT FOR ARCHERY RANGE, AND SETTING
 OUT THE REQUIREMENTS FOR URBAN ARCHERY HUNTING

BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Scottsville, Virginia, that a new Section 58-44.1 is hereby enacted as follows:

Section 58-44.1 Use of Bow and Arrow Restricted; Permit Required for Archery Range; Urban Archery Hunting

(A) The use of bow and arrows and establishment of an Archery Range within the Town limits shall be subject to the following restrictions:

- (i) No person shall shoot or discharge an arrow from a bow within the Town, except upon an Archery Range which has been approved as to the safety of location and construction by the Chief of Police;
- (ii) No minor shall shoot or discharge an arrow from a bow within the Town, except upon an Archery Range which has been approved as to safety of location and construction by the Chief of Police and then only when under the immediate supervision of an adult;
- (iii) Nothing in this section shall apply to the discharge of an arrow, equipped with a blunt tip or rubber suction cup from a bow with a “pull” or “draw weight” of less than ten (10) pounds;
- (iv) No person shall set up or operate an Archery Range in the Town without first obtaining a permit from the Chief of Police. The Chief of Police shall issue a permit for construction and operation of an Archery Range only after the location and construction of the same have been proven to his satisfaction to be consistent with the public safety.

(B) URBAN ARCHERY HUNTING. Section 58-44.1 shall not apply when discharging an arrow from a bow for the purpose of deer hunting within the Town of Scottsville limits during the Urban Archery Season, the Early Archery Season, the General Firearms Deer season, as designated in regulations set forth by the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries under the following conditions:

- (i) On land that is three (3) acres or more of contiguous area approved by the Town Administrator and the Chief of Police;

- (ii) The landowner or Landowners have applied for an annual permit from the Chief of Police to use their property for the purpose of discharging archery equipment and have identified their properties as such by signage approved by the Chief of Police;
 - (iii) Any person discharging a bow shall, at all times, while engaged in such activity, have in his or her possession written permission from the Landowner(s) to discharge such a weapon on the premises;
 - (iv) Agreement shall be made between the participant and Landowner(s) in reference to field dress;
 - (v) All participants must abide by all applicable sections of the Virginia State Code and Virginia Hunting Regulations, further, the following restrictions apply:
 - a. Discharge of a bow must be done from an elevated stand from a minimum height of ten (10) feet.
 - b. No person shall discharge a bow within one-hundred (100) yards of any dwelling, building, street, sidewalk, outlet, roadway, public land, or public places within Town limits. Further, all hunting shall be done internally to the property approved for hunting.
 - c. A person shall neither discharge a bow from, over, or across any street, sidewalk, alley, roadway, or public land or public place within Town limits or toward any building or dwelling in such a manner that an arrow may strike it, nor shall a person discharge a bow over or across the private property of another without permission.
 - d. No person shall hunt deer within the Town limits by use of a dog or dogs.
 - e. Urban Archery Season is restricted to hunting antlerless deer only.
 - f. Any person engaging in deer hunting must dispose of deer carcasses appropriately.
 - g. It shall be unlawful to carry firearms while hunting with bow and arrow during the Special Archery seasons, except as allowed under state law.
- (C) Any person violating any provision of this section shall be guilty of a Class III Misdemeanor.

10. STREET SIGN REPLACEMENT

Mr. Goodwin explained the issue is whether to accept the perforated silver posts or to pay extra for the round poles at \$150 per pole. Mayor Grove asked if there was an ARB recommendation. Mr. Goodwin said no, but they cannot afford to do anything different, noting that half of the signs in town already use the silver perforated posts.

Ms. Gill moved to use the free poles. Mr. Nolt seconded the motion.

Mr. Smith asked what the project cost to the town is if they use the free poles. Mr. Goodwin replied nothing. Mr. Smith asked that being the case, how much of the \$3,500 budgeted for this year will be unspent. Mr. Goodwin said they still have some other signage needs. Ms. Knotts asked about disposal of the current signs. Mr. Goodwin replied that they will save some of them. Ms. Gill asked about selling them.

The motion was approved by unanimous voice vote.

11. VISITORS CENTER

Mayor Grove explained that it was the sense of the council that it would be wise to determine if the old jail can be rented or occupied by some small business who would in turn continue the operation as a visitor center, especially on the weekends. Several small businesses have expressed interest. Mr. Goodwin listed the inquiries received, including a home brewing supply shop, crafts, food, and a nonprofit organization. Mayor Grove suggested asking Mr. Goodwin to make a recommendation on which business to contract with, and then the Town Council would vote on the rental contract and terms. Mr. Smith asked for an estimate of the rental income with the provision that the occupant pays the utility bills.

Ms. Knotts related that Legacy Mustang Preservation has offered to give council members a tour of the mustang preserve so they can understand the organization's mission.

12. USDA GRANT/LOAN APPLICATION FOR PUBLIC SAFETY EQUIPMENT

Mr. Goodwin explained that the USDA will have funds available in August, and preliminary scoring indicates that the town's application would score well because of the area and purpose. Mr. Goodwin stated that Chief Layman suggested this because of the need to access trails in the park in the event of an emergency, where SUVs cannot reach. Ms. Gill said the rescue squad has an apparatus for this, and the town should not be in the business of rescuing. Mr. Goodwin stated that it is not for rescue only, but also for the police to reach any incident there. He described the potential dual use for maintenance, noting that the cost for the building and unit is \$20,000, the USDA would fund 75 percent, and the remainder would be financed at 3 percent interest. Mr. Goodwin said this loan would impact the town budget by less than \$100 per month. He said he cannot guarantee the money will be available the next time.

Mayor Grove thanked Mr. Goodwin for bringing it to their attention, but the council is not clear on the need. He asked for a motion to continue discussion.

Mr. Gritsko moved to consider the request. Mr. Smith seconded.

Mayor Grove explained that the proposal is for a grant and loan to get an off-road vehicle that could have dual use for public safety and maintenance, with an associated building to house it. Mr. Goodwin stated that it also includes a snow blade to help clear town lots.

Mr. Gritsko asked for Chief Layman's comments on this. Mr. Goodwin said that Chief Layman suggested this for dual use, not just for the police department. Mr. Goodwin remarked that have proven with the Gator from parks and rec that it is a good asset, but with the age of the Gator they were given, it will not last forever, and this is an opportunity to make sure they do not have a gap. Mr. Gritsko remarked that they are in a trial period with the current Gator, and there is not a pressing need for a new one, while there are other things that are pressing needs, but this is a valuable opportunity for the town to consider.

Ms. Knotts recalled that Mr. Goodwin had said the application is due by May 31. Mr. Goodwin stated that the review is in August, and USDA is asking for an application as soon as possible. Mr. Goodwin said they could consider it further in June but would need to be ready to get the paperwork in to qualify. Ms. Knotts asked if they have to specify what they want with the grant. Mr. Goodwin replied yes, explaining that one of the reasons the town scores highly is because the equipment can be used for public safety with the police. He said the town can borrow money from the USDA for other purposes, such as replacing the roof, but USDA grant funds are not available for this. Mr. Gritsko suggested that Mr. Goodwin come back next month with a more compelling reason to pursue this. Mr. Goodwin noted the current Gator has no turn signals or brake lights, which the new one would have.

Mayor Grove remarked that it is tough for the council to authorize expenditures for marginal needs at a time when they are under such budget pressure. He asked whether council wants to do an up or down on this now or pass it to the next meeting.

Ms. Knotts asked what the Public Safety Committee thinks. Mr. Nolt suggested asking Chief Layman to attend the next meeting to discuss this, as he has not brought it up at the Public Safety Committee meetings. Ms. Gill commented that the more immediate public safety need is slowing people down, and she asked about a speed sign that collects data to allow the police officers to study where the majority of speeders are at any given point in the day so they can better enforce public safety. Ms. Gill said she would rather see pricing and a proposal for that rather than a Gator. Mr. Goodwin stated that a hand-me-down speed sign is coming from the county, and this would also be stored in that new building. Ms. Knotts asked if the town could get pre-approval for the speed sign concept, as well. Mr. Goodwin replied that he will inquire and let the council know by email next week. Mayor Grove said to carry this topic over to the next work session.

13. AUTHORIZATION TO OPEN BB&T BANK ACCOUNT FOR FARMERS' MARKET SNAP/EBT

Ms. Gill moved to authorize the opening of a bank account for the Farmers' Market SNAP/EBT program. Ms. Knotts seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

14. MOWING CONTRACT

Mr. Smith stated that in years past, contracts were advertised and council then voted to award. He said that if they have not advertised for bids, they should; and if is the only bid received, they should vote on it.

Mayor Grove asked if they advertised. Mr. Goodwin replied no, they have not; this is an ongoing relationship. Mayor Grove stated that this is not a contract that must be advertised by law, but it might be good to advertise it nonetheless. Mr. Goodwin said this is just getting what was an ongoing relationship that they had established with Kim and Gene Yoder and pulling it all on paper, making it more of a contract. Ms. Knotts agreed, commenting that as part of being more established and professional with park cleanup, a lot of these things were

being done as volunteers, but to continue to maintain that, she feels they need to finalize the contract and make it official what is being done, because they do not want to burn out the people who have spent hundreds of hours volunteering for the community. Ms. Knotts stated that this will be almost the same amount as spent this year. Mr. Goodwin said that Kim Yoder will still touch base with him to decide each week whether the parks need to be mowed, rather than automatically approving so many cuts.

Mayor Grove stated that the only issue is whether they should advertise to ensure that everyone has a fair chance to bid on the work; it is not a legal issue, but rather an issue of fairness. Mr. Smith commented that this is a good deal, but he does not want anyone coming out of the shadows to object.

Mayor Grove asked what is the council's pleasure. Ms. Knotts stated that the request of the Government Services Committee has been for several months that all contracts be reviewed before the mowing season, but they are in the mowing season now, therefore they have not been reviewed. Ms. Knotts recommends that they all get reviewed for the next fiscal year, but advertising for a contract in the middle of a mowing season is hard to do. Ms. Gill asked about the contract term. Ms. Knotts replied that it covers March to November.

Ms. Gill asked if they can contract from March to June only, or if they can go into the next fiscal year. Ms. Knotts said that technically this contract would be for the next fiscal year. Mayor Grove said yes, this council can do a contract that carries over to the next fiscal year if it so chooses, or it can wait and let the new council have a second look. Ms. Knotts said that if they wait, the levee mowing contract should be reviewed as well. Ms. Knotts noted that the contract is already being implemented. Mayor Grove suggested that one option is to continue as they are to July 1 and let the new council vote on the contract for July 1 to the end of the season. Mr. Goodwin cautioned against bidding it out in the middle of the current season. Mayor Grove said to let that be the decision of the new council. Council members agreed to review the park mowing and levee mowing contracts in July.

15. REPORTS OF CHARTERED COMMITTEES, PLANNING COMMISSION, AND ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW BOARD

Planning Commission: The commission did not meet this month.

Architectural Review Board: The board did not meet this month.

Public Safety Committee: Mr. Nolt reported that the committee discussed recent incidents handled by local police. The committee has been brainstorming ideas on how to slow down drivers, particularly on the weekends with more foot traffic. Mr. Nolt has asked Chief Layman to request that officers station their cars at the funeral home, Dollar General, or the police department when they have time. Mr. Nolt reported that committee discussed the crosswalk signs in the middle of the road, but he was informed that the width of the street does not allow that given the size of the trucks that come through. Mr. Goodwin said that flashing lights on the sign poles at the side of the street are an option, but VDOT has killed the embedded lights option.

Ms. Knotts asked who enforces restrictions on-street tenant parking. Mr. Goodwin said they somewhat relaxed on that after the Dollar General relocated, but they have asked tenants to park in off-street lots when they know there will be more activity downtown. Ms. Moyer said that parking restrictions apply only to the tenants above the former Dollar General space because it was a condition of the special use permit to add those apartments; there is no restriction on any other tenants downtown.

Ms. Gill stated that last Thursday there was an event at the fire house regarding CSX and hazardous spills. She asked if the town was invited to that. Mr. Goodwin replied no. Ms. Gill said it was a big event, and when something like that comes across, the town should be apprised of it. Mr. Goodwin said he will speak to Chief Grandstaff.

Farmers' Market: Shannon Bostic reported that they are five weeks into the 2016 market season, and 24 vendors have paid in full. Some are seasonal, and about two-thirds have showed up so far. The concert in conjunction with the market last week went well but was a bit chaotic, so it may take some reconfiguring for next year. Planning is underway for Community Day in September to get a group of diverse vendors. They received great feedback from the recent advertisement in Edible Blue Ridge, and overall attendance has been good so far.

Ms. Gill noted that the civic part of Community Day will be held at Canal Basin Square from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., and the Central Virginia Blues Society will have three bands there. Ms. Bostic suggested creating a vendor info sheet for the day like the one for Scottsville Second Saturdays.

Laara Gervais asked if there will be Thursday market this year. Ms. Bostic replied that the idea was delegated to a member of the farmers' market committee to compile a list of eight to ten vendors to move forward, but she has not received this yet, so at this point it will probably be next year. Ms. Knotts explained that the vendor who was most interested in the Thursday market day was given the opportunity to organize it.

Beautification and Maintenance Committee: Ms. Knotts displayed pictures of the recent project in collaboration with the James River Association, the Scottsville United Methodist Church, and Lucky's to do a buffer planting on Mink Creek, which will help keep pollutants out of the James River. Ms. Knotts reported that the committee plans to meet in an advisory capacity every two to three months. She noted the committee's achievement of many goals in the parks throughout the past four years.

Ms. Knotts said the plans to have a group of volunteers clear the levee toe were canceled, so the council should consider whether to pay to have the work done. Mr. Goodwin stated that they have to move forward within 30 days to get it done prior to the levee inspection. Mr. Smith asked about the corner that they determined was not the town's. Mr. Goodwin said that corner is not the town's, but the levee still is, so the town has to get the stuff off of it regardless. Mr. Smith recalled that clearing was done to a point and stopped. Mr. Goodwin said that Rittenhouse did that, but then they ran into a swampy area. Mr. Goodwin said that

Tapscott has offered to place wooden mats, and then Rittenhouse can go across with an excavator and do the clearing, or volunteers can get in to cut.

Ms. Knotts asked how waiting on this would impact flood insurance. Mr. Goodwin said they are good if they move on it in the next 30 days, as they do not have an immediate inspection coming up. Mayor Grove said that if they cannot get it done by volunteers within 30 days, then pay to get it done. Ms. Knotts agreed.

Tourism and Economic Development Committee: Mr. Gritsko reported that they have been working for a year to make good on Phase 1 of VCNA, which includes the Jefferson Street entrance. Over the winter they worked on making the Mink Creek Trail more accessible and made good progress until the spring growth. This summer they will focus on trying to make those areas of the park more usable. They are currently looking at signage and logo design and will soon commence a fundraising effort. Mr. Gritsko reported that the economic development subcommittee next meets on May 31 at 6:00 p.m.

Arts and Culture Committee: Ms. Gill reported that the third Scottsville Second Saturdays event is June 11. Ms. Gill explained that the Art Walk is just a part of the event, which was started with a goal of getting people from outside of Scottsville to walk into the doors of town businesses at least once a month. Jammin' on the James concerts are planned for June 11, August 13, and September 10 at Canal Basin Square, while the July 4 concert is at Dorrier Park. Community Day is also September 10.

16. TOWN ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Mr. Goodwin reported that Frankie Ward of A. Scott Ward Realty made a complaint about the lack of production and cleanup at 496 Valley Street. The property manager has promised to address the issue but is behind the ARB's timeframe to proceed, and A. Scott Ward has lost a parking space as a result. Mr. Goodwin proposes to formalize a letter to ensure speedy process.

Mr. Goodwin reported that he received a request about flags, and generally the town replaces them annually around Memorial Day. The flagpole light at the Police Department was replaced today. Tank removal at the Gulf station on East Main was successful, with assistance from the Scottsville Fire Department and Albemarle County.

Mr. Gritsko asked how much land the town owns in Buckingham. Ms. Moyer estimated that it is around 30 acres. Mr. Gritsko asked how accessible the property is. Mr. Goodwin replied that it is grown up. Mayor Grove said it borders the road. Mr. Gritsko recalled that last month Mr. Goodwin mentioned the availability of a gravel donation. Mr. Gritsko asked if the gravel can be stored on the Buckingham lot, as the gravel is in larger quantities than could be used in the near future. Mayor Grove said he does not think they want to put gravel on that acreage. Mr. Goodwin stated that he can personally stockpile some for the town on his property. Ms. Moyer said the Buckingham property was seeded after it was timbered, so there may not be anywhere to place the gravel. Mr. Goodwin stated it is a lot of pine trees. Mr. Gritsko asked how many loads they would have. Mr. Goodwin replied the donor has

about 200 loads left, and they are hauling 24 loads a day, so they will have 20-odd loads there if they say yes. Mr. Goodwin explained that the gravel is suitable for the base of the new parking lot at Pine Road and the ramp down to the fishing dock and turnaround, but it is not suitable for walking without something on top. Mayor Grove commented that the town would not have a problem accepting a stockpile of gravel if they have a place to put it.

Mr. Goodwin reported that VDOT is planning sign work and a berm in front of Doug's Maytag. He received compliments on Saturday afternoon from a lifelong resident that she and her husband had not seen this many people on the streets of Scottsville since the 1960s. Mr. Goodwin remarked on the upbeat spirit of the farmers' market this year.
